NZ District Keys

These books are situated next to the fiche drawers by the window and have Births and deaths 1854???
To 1941???

They hold information of **where a birth or death was registered**, which is not necessarily where the event took place. This information **is not available** online DIA historical indexes.

Now that ancestry has the NZ Birth, Death indexes you can check the folio numbers provided on the index against the District Keys to determine the registration district from the comfort of your own home (if you have an Ancestry subscription).

There are no books for marriages, because the minister, priest or Vicar sent the copies of marriages to the RGO. you'll need alternate means for those. (Intentions to Marry – Liceneces)

You will still have to use the fiche at the Hokonui Heritage Center for the years not covered online either on Ancestry or the Dept of Internal Affairs website.

Remembering in all instances, that to order a printout, you'll need the newer reference number from the DIA website instead of the older folio number. *Thanks to Kapiti Branch*

Divorce Records

You can apply to the high court to view divorce files within the 100 year restriction. The address for Auckland is aucklandhc@justice.govt.nz.

This is what I wrote in my last request
I wish to request access to the following divorce file, for family history purposes. I would like to be able to read and photograph the full file. Both parties to the divorce are no longer alive.

You have to say you want to view the full file otherwise they might only grant access to the decree nisi which isn't going to be much help.

Under my request I attach details of the divorce file with a link to the record. In the case of both parties being deceased I provide details of their death with a link to the record - either NZ BDM, Cemetery Record or Archives Probate record. I also give my Archives reader card number. When it is approved they send an email to Archives saying you have permission and you order in the normal way (there is a tick box in the online ordering to say you have permission for a restricted record).

Obviously if both parties are deceased it is going to be easiest, as you accessing the file is not going to hurt anyone. But as another example I recently got permission to view my own parent's divorce file (going to read that one today!). My father is deceased so I gave a link to his death record and I included written permission.

I have only ever done this with Auckland files. I should point out that I gave the same advice to someone in Christchurch and she was denied access due to the 100 year limit, even after providing details of the deaths of both parties. I have advised her to go back to the court and try to talk to someone as I have a feeling it was just an over zealous person sticking to the rules unnecessarily.

This is the website for British Railway History from its beginnings right up to the present day with around 9,000 accident reports and 4,000 other documents.

This worldwide website relies on volunteers to take photos and compile indexes of the names on them. A small image of each headstone is able to be viewed and downloaded from the site but a high quality digital image can be requested free. Coverage in New Zealand is best for Auckland and Marlborough. For Australia most graves are in South Australia, Queensland and Victoria. Edinburgh is well covered.

Child Migration

From 1869 to 1948
various

workhouses, sheltered homes,
orphanages and child care

organizations such as Barnado's sent over 100,000 orphaned, abandoned, pauper children ages 1 to 18 to Canada and other Commonwealth countries. They have come to be known as the British Home Children. The children were equipped with a trunk; a - good set of clothes; a Bible; and a copy of —The Pilgrim's Progress.

The idea of giving children from the poorer areas of Great Britain a -better life|| in the Colonies may have originally been seen as a benevolent move, however it was not long before the children were being set to work as, what can really only be described as, slave labour. They were often poorly fed and clothed, and had to work out in the fields in all weathers

Mostly the children were about 16 years of age, but there were many who were much younger who were generally put up for adoption. The boys were usually indentured to a farmer, and the girls put into service, until they reached the age of 18, at which point they could leave and do other things.

Unfortunately, many of them were never paid the small allowance that was due to them, so were left with few opportunities to advance in life.

It is estimated that over 4 million of the Canadian population, that is 12%, are a descendant of a Home Child.

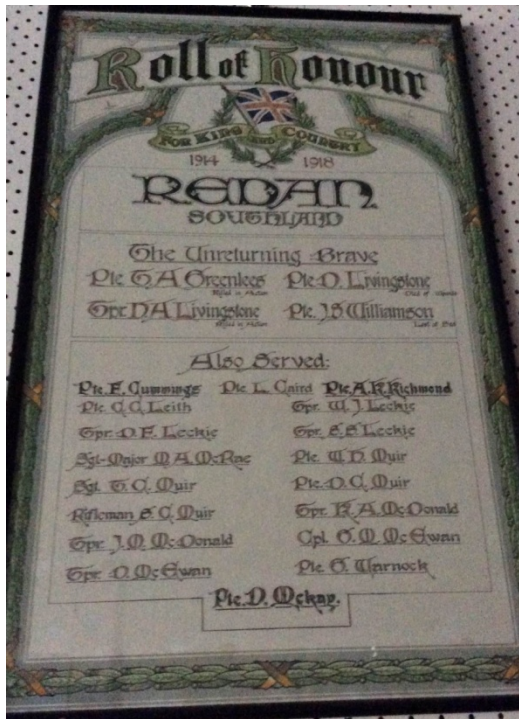

Redan—farming locality in the valley of the Redan Stream, 13kms south east of Wyndham, 31kms from Mataura. Flaxmilling until 1972. Named after the Russian fort overlooking the port city of Sebastopol on the Crimea Peninsula. Ukraine.

Born 1886 , son of late Dugald and Mary (nee McDonald), Livingstone, of Browns. Born 1886.

Died of wounds 1918 between England and France.

Honoured on Brookwood Military Cemetery. Woking, Surrey, England

Hugh Alexander Livingstone- Trooper 9/1968

son of late Dugald and Mary (nee McDonald), Livingstone, of Browns. Born 189, son of M Livingstone, Winton. Left Port Chalmers 16 October 1914 for Suez Canal Egypt on ship Ruapehu
Died 6 or 7 August 1915 at Gallipoli, Turkey.

Honoured on Chunuk Bair NZ Cemetery, Gallipoli, Turkey

James Smith Williamson – Private 82406

Son of James and Elizabeth WILLIAMSON (nee Smith) of Redan. James was a farmer . He embarked from Wellington 2 October 1918 on ship Matatua for London, England.

Drowned 27 September 1919 (lost overboard). .

Honoured on the Otago Provincial Memorial, Andersons Bay, Dunedin.

The Wakefield baptisms contain 28,372 records - transcripts of original parish registers made by the Wakefield and District Family History Society, covering 9 parishes: Wakefield All Saints, Warmfield St Peter's, Chapelthorpe St James, Monk Bretton St Paul's, Felkirk St Peter's, Ryhill St James, Wragby St Michael's, Wakefield St Andrew's, South Ossett Christ Church Spanning the years 1622 to 1913, and added to the existing collection of Wakefield baptisms - now totalling 213,000 records and over 30 parishes from Wakefield district in West Yorkshire.
