PAPERSPAST UPDATE

One new newspaper title has been added in January and 4 others have had more years added:

Te Awamutu Courier April 1936 to 1950 This paper was previously named Waipa Post (which is available from 1911 to April 1936)

Southland Times 1921-1928 (coverage starts in 1862) Taranaki Daily News 1921-1928 (coverage starts in 1900)

Wanganui Chronicle 1920-1950 (coverage starts in 1860)

Timaru Herald 1936-1945 (coverage starts (coverage starts in 1864)

Three of these are shortlived newspapers based in Gisborne, no issues of which have previously been digitised.

The other 3 titles are existing papers based in **Greymouth, Hastings and Waimate.**

Grey River Argus: years 1921-1935 added. This daily starts in 1866

Hawke's Bay Tribune: 1921-1936 added. This daily starts in 1910.

Waimate Daily Advertiser: years 1905-1906 and 1920-1929 added. Daily from 1914. Starts in 1898. **Gisborne Standard & Cook County Gazette**: 1887-1891. Published 3 days a week.

Poverty Bay Independent: 1885-1886. Published Saturdays only at the start then 3 days per week. **Poverty Bay Standard:** 1872-1876; 1881-1884. Publication varied from 2 to 6 days a week. For its final year it was renamed The Telephone.

RESEARCH USING NEW ZEALAND ELECTORAL ROLLS: PART 4

I showed an example from the 1905 Waiapu Roll in which married women were sometimes identified as the wife of their named husbands on the same roll. In the course of recent research into a branch of my family-tree I have come across another instance of a Registrar who did a similar thing with his 1903 Patea (Taranaki) electoral roll. However, he identified the women on his roll in many different ways. I have only looked at a few pages from this roll. One of these is shown on the next page.

Here is a list of his descriptions of female electors: domestic duties, household duties, home duties, house



duties, housewife, wife, farmer's wife, married, domestic duties, married, married woman, spinster, domestic spinster, domestic duties, "spinster spinster, general servant, spinster, dressmaker, widow, lady housekeeper,

mother's help, lady help, companion, housemaid, waitress, assistant post mistress, schoolmistress, school teacher, teacher, music teacher, nurse, farmer,



farming, dressmaker assistant, dressmaker, art needlework, dealer, milliner, saleswoman, draper, picture farmer,

Searchable by name, place, and occupation this is an essential tool for local, urban, and family history. You can find Kelly's and Pigot's directories here, as well as those by regional publishers. The collection provides access to scanned images and full text of the trade directories. These are large items, so please be patient if free text searching the whole collection. Ellis Island was a bleak unforgiving place where any family member who failed the strict health and dental inspection





I was delighted to see Shetland listed on this map in the correct location.

Interestingly the percentage of DNA from Scotland has been increasing: it's 14% now, but it was shown as 8% last autumn, and in the update before that it was only 3%...

It's important to remember that whilst we inherit an equal amount of autosomal DNA from each parent — one set of chromosomes from each — the DNA passed on to us won't be representative of our parents' ancestry, because we don't get an equal amount from each grandparent. That's another reason why ethnicity estimates have to be regarded very cautiously!

I have made most of my indexes available to Diane for her to use if she wishes to publish on that website.

DNA Testing for Family History



From the editor: Gail Riddel has written quite a series on DNA Testing.

You will see them all on the FAMNET website and they are a must-read, particularly if you are considering or have had a test done. They are easy to read

and not too technical

Transfer your Autosomal DNA from your testing to another company – Part 1 of 3.

If you have been reading my articles on DNA for a while, you will know there are three types of DNA.

(let's start with Ancestry. Here are the steps to follow.

- 1. Log into your Ancestry account and in the top menu under DNA, click on 'Your DNA Results' Summary.
- 2. 2 Click on the 'gear' icon to your right this takes you to your settings.
- 3. 3 Note the box called 'Actions' click on the box saying Download Raw DNA data
- 4. 4 Enter your Ancestry password and check the box showing you understand the need to protect your data.
- 5. 5 Confirm and you will receive an email giving you further instructions. Open it and click on the greenish box confirming the download.
- 6. 6 This will take you back to your Ancestry page click on Download DNA Raw Data.
- 7. 7 If your downloaded files normally go to your 'Downloads' folder, it will be a zip file showing 'dnadata' and a date.

Now you can upload that Ancestry DNA file to whichever of the following companies you want.

Note that you should not upload autosomal DNA to a company which already has your autosomal results.

These are

- o FamilyTreeDNA (FTDNA)
- o Gedmatch
- o Living DNA
- o MyHeritage DNA
